A Year of Transformation



Annual Report 2018

2018 marks the first year the Drexel Libraries fully engaged in activities guided by its refreshed 2017-22 Strategic Plan.

It has been a year of laying the groundwork to position the Libraries to continue its transformation to be an effective and relevant organization to advance the learning and research mission of the University. The Libraries is a Learning Enterprise, inspiring the life-long quest for learning, strengthening connections to scholarship, and containing the costs to do so.

This year we set in motion new strategies to strengthen the Libraries' flexibility to respond to inevitable and unknown changes. We began to evolve a reorganization to align the Libraries' organizational structure with our strategic foci, to leverage our diverse professional expertise to advance the University priorities, to inspire staff engagement to transform the Libraries' relevance, and to provide opportunities for our staff's professional growth.

Among the initiatives we successfully explored this year, several focused on innovative ways to complement the Libraries' hard-working, passionate and committed—but relatively lean—workforce.

We introduced the Library Faculty Fellows program that engaged four Drexel faculty to contribute their expertise and energies to key initiatives within our

Strategic Plan, and it resulted in a strong cohort of supportive advocates who continue to engage with us well after their fellowships formally ended.

We also tapped students to serve as Library Explorers, helping us better understand and communicate with students with diverse motivations, while extending our guidance to develop savvy, self-directed learners.

Internally, we started a tradition of Kitchen Table Talks, bringing together all Libraries staff for small group discussions with me, during which we uncovered creative and engaging ideas for transforming the Libraries, while improving awareness of what we are doing across our geographically dispersed staff.

The Libraries' terrific staff deserve the credit and appreciation for this year of transformation highlighted in this Annual Report.

As one of the Libraries' strategic leaders observed, the Libraries is modeling what we advocate our various academic communities to be—engaged and caring champions of the power of knowledge in inspiring self-directed learning and contributing to scholarship.


CONTAINING THE COSTS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The Drexel Libraries has long supported efforts to help lower the out-of-pocket expenses students incur to access curricular readings, and we continued to focus our efforts in this area this past year.

For example, we reaffirmed our commitment to ensuring access to information over building physical collections of publications.

We also pledged support of the open textbook movement, joining more than 1,000 other organizations in the Open Textbook Network, a membership that will help faculty support the adoption of open textbooks at Drexel.





FROM 'BUILDING COLLECTIONS' TO 'ENSURING ACCESS'

In FY2017, the Drexel Libraries reaffirmed its commitment to a model of “ensuring access” to authoritative information.

We are building far fewer physical collections of publications, and instead providing access to resources—both online and in print—through a combination of licensing, purchasing and resource sharing.

In the past, accreditation requirements and reviews of professional master’s degree programs influenced

the Libraries’ collection-building. But in recent years, “impact on student success” has instead become a key driver of these decisions.

Decisions to purchase and negotiate licensed access or to utilize resource sharing options are now driven by multiple factors, such as determining the most economical access option, prioritizing convenience against expense to meet curricula and research requirements, and seeking input from the Drexel community.

SUPPORTING ALTERNATIVES TO TRADITIONAL TEXTBOOKS

More than 1,000 academic institutions belong to the Open Textbook Network, and Drexel is now one of them.

The Libraries joined the OTN in June 2018 on behalf of the University and is excited to facilitate the benefits of that membership on campus. The OTN maintains the Open Textbook Library (the premiere resource for peer-reviewed openly licensed academic textbooks) and helps academic institutions advance the use of open textbooks on their campuses.


Membership in the organization includes access to a suite of tools and resources, including practice guidelines and data collection tools, faculty workshops, leadership development activities and access to publishing resources—resources our staff will use to facilitate access, awareness and adoption of open education resources on campus in the years to come.

SHAPING FUTURE SCHOLARSHIP

At Drexel, the Libraries plays a key role in strengthening the University's contributions to scholarship.

Our efforts to shape future scholarship by making Drexel research easily discoverable take many forms, from promoting the importance and benefits of open access to providing research data management support.

This year, we focused our efforts on improving our online systems to meet the current and future information needs of the Drexel Community and to maximize the exposure and impact of Drexel research.



SHAPING DISCOVERY OF RESEARCH

In September 2017, the Drexel Libraries successfully migrated its website to a new Content Management System (CMS) called Sitecore, the web-accessed CMS used for almost all other Drexel University academic and administrative websites. Libraries staff used this as an opportunity to reorganize the website's top navigation drop-down menus to ensure an optimal user experience.

A few months later, the Libraries took another big step towards improving its online presence when we completed an agreement with Ex Libris, a ProQuest Company, to subscribe to its Alma Library Services Platform.

For Drexel students, faculty and staff, this new system will streamline both finding and accessing scholarly resources they need for their learning, teaching and research. Additional tools under development will also enable members of the Drexel community to link into the latest practices for managing research data.

The Alma implementation process started in January 2018 and will be completed in August 2018.

SHAPING A NEW LIBRARY SYSTEM

For any global research university, capturing and disseminating research outputs are essential, albeit challenging. This year, the Libraries continued its work to ensure maximum exposure and impact of Drexel research and to improve the University's capacity to influence future scholarship.

In April 2017, the Libraries, along with the Graduate College and the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences & Professional Studies, implemented an online-only submission process for all Drexel graduate theses and dissertations. This commitment to digital submissions reflects the Libraries' move away from print and the importance it places on iDEA, the University's multipurpose institutional repository.

The Libraries also joined other research institutions in the Ex Libris Esploro™ Early Adopter Program in late June. As a participant in the program, Drexel will be closely involved in providing product feedback and shaping the development of Esploro to meet the needs of research universities.

This new research services platform will enable the Libraries to strengthen the University's connections to scholarship, while broadening the impact of Drexel's research output and maximizing the efficiency of managing research data and publications for global discovery and access. The first Esploro release will be available to early adopters for field testing in 2019.

INSPIRING A LIFE-LONG QUEST FOR LEARNING

In informal learning environments such as libraries, learners are expected to take ownership of the paths they take to develop new skills or increase knowledge. The Libraries continually looks for innovative ways to inspire this life-long quest for learning among Drexel students, faculty and staff.

As in years past, we put much of our energy into building knowledge communities through events like our ScholarSip and ScholarSnack event series.

Transforming our physical environments into spaces that inspire students to learn, explore and discover new ideas with their peers was also a key priority this year, and we were thrilled with the renovations to what is now called the Dragons' Learning Den (formerly the Bookmark Café).





INSPIRING ACTIVE LEARNING THROUGH EFFECTIVE DESIGN

After (finally!) removing the last remnants of the old Taco Bell from the Bookmark Café in April, we were excited to continue the transformation of this 24/7 space within the W. W. Hagerty Library with new furniture, new technology and a new name: The Dragons' Learning Den.

Sunlight now streams into the space, thanks to the removal of the retail eatery, and high-top tables and chairs line the front windows. An enclosed workspace offers students some privacy for group work, and the new "Practice Zone" with 80" ThinkHub monitor was designed as an environment where groups can brainstorm, collaborate, visualize, problem solve and practice presentations together on screen.

INSPIRING NEW KNOWLEDGE COMMUNITIES

The Drexel Libraries continued its tradition of hosting its ScholarSip and ScholarSnack events during the fall, winter and spring terms, with 159 faculty, professional staff and students from a variety of disciplines attending the six events.

This year, the ScholarSip faculty series covered the theme Research Matters: Connecting Drexel to Global Scholarship. Each term, Drexel researchers addressed this theme by reflecting on how the dissemination of research through publication is critical to the development of knowledge in their areas of research. "Food for thought" speakers included Yury Gogotsi, PhD, College of Engineering; Ana V. Diez Roux, MD, Dornsife School of Public Health; and Gordon Richards, PhD, College of Arts & Sciences.

ScholarSnack took a different focus from years past, when events typically featured formal student presentations on some aspect of research or academic inquiry. Instead, this year's events focused on stimulating open and honest conversations about the Libraries' programs and learning environments. In fact, conversations from the December 2017 and March 2018 events influenced the renaming of the Bookmark Café to the Dragons' Learning Den and the "Two Truths & One Lie" competition held in May!
